In Thailand, a wild elephant gave everyone a big surprise when he walked into a shop and helped himself to some tasty snacks! The elephant, named Plai Biang Lek, is 27 years old and lives near Khao Yai National Park, He's known in the area, but this was the first time he had stepped inside a shop. 'He walked up to the candy counter and used his trunk to pick out what he wanted,' said shop owner Khamploi Kakaew. Plai Biang Lek chose sweets, dried bananas, and peanut snacks while another elephant waited outside for him! Later, a wildlife group gave the shop

800 baht (about £17) to cover the elephant's 'shopping bill'. Elephants sometimes visit towns when their forest homes shrink. Local groups are helping to keep them safe and protect their homes. *Elephants are Thailand's national animal, but only 3,000-4,000 are in the wild – down from over 100,000 long ago.*



The team's website explains, 'Discover the sport of Underwater Rugby – the best game you've never heard of! Join us for an exhilarating experience. In teams of 6,

equipped with fins, mask, and snorkel. Your aim is to score points by sinking the ball into the opponent's basket which is placed 4m below the pool surface. They are encouraging adults to try out their sport and say it is suitable for everyone. There are mixed teams, who play by attempting to wrestle a ball, slightly smaller than a football, past the opponent's defenders and goalkeeper and into the bin-like basket to score!
